It's always fun to watch and see these innovate fly fishermen do their thing, but we also need some folks to help us pull this off! Here is what we need:

We still need some Monitors. This entails being assigned your own 'beat' of around 200 yards on the Upper Kings River or Hume Lake. Bring a lawn chair. You will watch one angler fish. When he catches a fish, he brings it to you in his net for measuring. You also observe him release the fish correctly. (They lose points if they hurt a fish.) You keep note on a chart provided how many fish and size for each angler. You will have 4 different anglers rotate through that beat, two on Saturday and

two on Sunday. Check out the Agenda bellow for times to start, each session lasts 3 hours. We are starting early on Sunday in order to get home at a reasonable time. Sunday is daylight Savings so starting an hour earlier won't be as hard as it sounds.

Conservation Corner

Jimmie Morales, Fred Ramirez and I have been talking to some folks about the Whitlock Vibert boxes that the club used to plant brown trout eggs in the Lower Kings during the late 80's. We've been talking about what it would take to have more wild trout in the Kings, specifically where it is regulated as fly fishing only.

After feedback from Stan Stephens we've come to realize that we can best help to the increase in trout in the Kings by supporting the efforts of Kings River Conservation District and the Department of Fish and Game with the current Vibert boxes filled with Rainbow Trout.

I am proposing to the Board next week that we double these permanent incubators, (buy two more) and fill these with more Rainbow Trout eggs. We would be able to plant these eggs where we feel they will best survive, season after season. The cost would be less than \$1500.

Also our club needs to support this effort with some real work. We will be taking sign ups for a club member to check all four boxes once per weekend. Please consider taking responsibility for perhaps one weekend a month. Email or call me if you are interested.

Stan's feedback on this question gave me a great outline of what's been happening on the Lower Kings, which is just what I've been wanting for the Fly Dope. I've included it, (with his permission), below.

Also please check www.KRCD.ORG web site where you can find three years of annual reports summarizing most of the fishery improvement work that has occurred on the lower river.

Stan's letter

Jayne,

I guess the first question I would ask is why the interest in brown trout in the lower Kings River?

As you know, the Department has entered into in an agreement with Kings River Conservation District and Kings River Water Association to make improvements to the lower Kings River fishery (Fisheries Management Program). This action involves increases in minimum stream flow during the non-irrigation period, significant habitat improvement and the stocking of hatchery reared trout as well as other activities.

There is some natural rainbow trout spawning occurring in the December-January period. This has been documented over several years, including years prior to our introduction of trout eggs to the river. Much of the documented spawning occurs just downstream of the dam. These are fall spawning rainbow trout (probably Coleman strain) from the hatchery that have become self-sustaining in the river. Rainbow trout spawning probably occurs elsewhere in the river, but has yet to be documented.

The Fisheries Management Program has gone through a series of projects to hatch eyed trout eggs in the river. This has consisted of using Whitlock Vibert Boxes (WVB), old refrigerators as streamside incubators and now two permanent streamside incubators. The refrigerators depended on gravity to supply the water to the eggs and there were problems at some sites and in some years. The current streamside incubators have electric pumps and have performed well (photo attached). Eyed rainbow trout eggs are placed in WVB which are then placed in the incubators and allowed to hatch. The fry remain in the incubator until they are large enough to escape out into the river. We also remove some of the fry from the boxes and distribute them in suitable habitat along the river.

We normally hatch between 100,000 and 200,000 eggs twice a year, although this varies from year to year. We use spring spawning rainbow trout eggs (usually Eagle Lake or Junction Kamloop-both wild strains) usually around April and fall spawning rainbow trout eggs

(mostly Coleman strain) usually between November and January. This project has been ongoing for at least five years and we generally experience a hatching suggest rate in the high 80 percent range. Is this contributing to the fishery? We are unsure at this point because it is difficult to differentiate trout spawned in the river and those from the boxes.

We are planting 25,000 subcatchable trout (4-6 inch) in October. These are generally Eagle Lake trout, which again are a wild strain. These trout are marked with an adipose fin clip so they can be identified as hatchery products if captured later (not missing adipose fin on fish in photo). Recent hook-and-line sampling (to collect fish for radio tagging) below the dam suggest these trout are contributing about 25% of the fish caught (photo attached). We also believe they are growing from 6 inches in length when planted to about 20-inches in about one and one-half years. This needs to be confirmed, but is similar to growth of rainbow trout documented for the, lower Kings River. This appears to be a very successful program and will continue

In December of last year the Department began planting large rainbow trout (5-7 pounds) that were part of a special hatchery program. These fish were provided special diets and lots of TLC by our San Joaquin hatchery personnel to improve the appearance of the trout. These were Coleman strain rainbow trout and were excellent in appearance and fighting ability (ask Roger, Hank and Kevin). A total of 3,000 pounds of large trout were planted in the lower river between December 2005 and March 2006.

Radio tags surgically inserted into the trout body cavity have provided information to indicate these large fish are still in the river and we expect fish in the eleven pound range to be available when the flows begin to drop later this year. This "big fish" stocking program will be repeated again this year with slightly larger rainbow trout.

The bottom line is we have a program in place using rainbow trout that appears to be working and we wish to support the continuation of this program.

Brown trout eggs have been planted in the river using WVB on at least two occasions. Although the eyed eggs hatched, the offspring never contributed to any degree to the fishery. The lower Kings River, like all rivers below dams in the central valley, is not very good brown trout habitat and a self-sustaining population would not be expected to develop. This is why you seldom see brown trout in these waters. Water temperatures in the fall are generally too warm for satisfactory brown trout egg maturation. While a few adult brown trout may be present, they are uncommon.


The brown trout that do survive are more difficult to catch than rainbow trout for the average angler. This means they could be around for some time and become large predators on other trout. They prefer the deep pools, to the exclusion of other trout, including other brown trout. We need more deep pools on the Kings as a refuge for rainbow trout, not brown trout.

If brown trout were to be successful in spawning, their offspring would probably out compete the small rainbow trout for the limited backwater habitat. The brown trout would spawn probably in October and the rainbows in December-January. That means the young-of-the year brown trout would be larger and out-compete the smaller rainbow trout to the detriment of the rainbow trout population.

The bottom line is that I can not support this project. I would suggest the club assist the Fisheries Management Program with maintenance of the streamside incubators when they are in operation (spring and fall). There is a need to check the incubators every other day when they are in operation and we could use some help.
